RFP process

- purpose of RFP:
 - New health plan choices 7/1/2016 for 30 northern MN counties (Medica was only plan option in 20 counties)
 - Increase plan choice and Medicare coverage for 1/1/2017
 - RFP included non-integrated counties only
- 4 responders: UCare, HealthPartners,
 MHP and Medica

RFP, continued

- Successful responders have been chosen and contract offers have been sent out
- RFP appears to have been a success in increasing health plan choice and integration
- Pending contract negotiation, expect to have health plan coverage in all MN counties as of July 1, 2016
- Successful bidders for all 20 counties where Medica was the only choice.
- Most of the 20 will now have 2 plan choices, 2 of the 20 will have 3 plan choices and 2 will have 1 plan choice
- Counties involved in RFP were confidentially notified of DHS entering into contract negotiations with successful responders in their county
- Pending DHS contract negotiation and CMS approval, could have integrated option statewide in 2017

Enrollee Communication

- Thanks to your input, this will be a client friendly mailing focused on people losing Medica coverage
 - Medica no longer available
 - Will be enrolled in new SNBC plan if no action
 - May choose a different SNBC plan
 - May opt out of SNBC
- No letters in May for people not losing Medica coverage in the 30 counties
- New health plan choices will be presented to:
 - New enrollees
 - Everyone at open enrollment
- Special letters for current enrollees over age 65 who are losing Medica coverage

Policy Recommendation

- Need for change in SNBC policy has been building
- Longstanding issue #1: people over age 65 need timely access to services
- Longstanding issue #2: improve options counseling for enrollees turning 65
- Factors making change more urgent:
 - Rapid SNBC program enrollment
 - Increased evidence of the value of Medicare integration
 - July 2016 scenarios
 - Adults without children eligibility in Medicaid
- After researching and discussing options we recommend bright line for people over 65; must enroll in seniors product

SNBC Olmstead Impacts

- Focus on dental in SNBC RFP
- In 2013, the number of adults continuously enrolled in Medicaid coverage during the measurement year accessing annual dental visits was 21, 393
- Annual goals
 - Increase by 335 over baseline by Dec 2016;
 - Increase by 670 over baseline by Dec 2017;
 - Increase by 1,055 over baseline by De c2018
- Continue looking for opportunities to collaborate to improve quality and increase access to dental services for people with disabilities
