Transitional Housing Program (THP)	Provides rental subsidies and supportive services to homeless individuals and families to attain and maintain permanent, stable housing. Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG)	A federal formula grant program. Long-term Homeless Support Services (LTHSS)	Long-term services and supports refers to on-going support that an individual, youth, or families with children need to maintain housing stability and live in the community of their choice. Funded activity	Activity description
Outreach services and drop-in centers	Outreach: Low-demand services that address basic needs (e.g., food, clothing, blankets) and seek to build relationships with the goal of moving people into emergency shelter or housing, and engaging them in services over time. Drop-In centers: Provides limited services during the day, assisting clients in securing basic needs, light touch respite care, information and referral and service connection.
Homeless prevention	Prevention includes a set of strategies to assist people in maintaining permanent housing and/or divert them from entering the homeless system. Service strategies are focused on addressing the immediate housing crisis and can be integrated with other mainstream services to address more long term needs. • Emergency financial assistance to help people avoid imminent homelessness and maintain housing stability • Supportive services, advocacy and mediation to mitigate factors leading to imminent homelessness.

Emergency shelter	Emergency Shelter programs (including motel vouchers) provide stabilization and assessment, focusing on quickly moving all persons to stable housing, regardless of disability or background. Emergency shelter is intended to be a short-term service that provides a safe, temporary place to stay with focus on initial housing assessment, immediate housing placement and linkage to other services
Site-based transitional housing	Safe, temporary housing located in project-based housing that focuses on housing planning and supportive services for individuals and families with temporary barriers to self-sufficiency. Housing assistance may be provided for up to two years, including rental assistance, housing stabilization services, landlord mediation, case management, budgeting, life skills, and parenting support.
Rapid Re-Housing	Rapid re-housing (RRH) is an intermediate-term intervention designed to help individuals and families to quickly exit homelessness and return to permanent housing. The core components of a rapid re-housing program are housing identification, rent and move-in assistance, and case management. For purposes of this tool, scattered-site transitional housing funded by the State of Minnesota (allowing households to transition in place) is included under this activity.
Permanent Supportive Housing	Single-site, project-based, clustered and scattered site permanent housing linked with supportive services that help residents maintain housing. Permanent supportive housing help clients with significant barriers to self-sufficiency, including chronic disabilities or long-term homelessness, maintain housing and address barriers. Permanent supportive housing programs provide subsidized housing or rental assistance; 24/7 tenant support services; and property management services.
