

Needs map: Data summary

Introduction

This tool consists of an interactive needs-based mapping interface, which summarizes different population needs based on their geography. It consists of 22 measures consolidated into five summary categories, including basic population, population by race, population by age, housing, and income, poverty and employment. This document describes the data sources and definitions of the measures used. The data is mapped on county, Continuum of Care region and the state levels. Most of the data has been sourced from the American Community Survey, 2011-2015, five year estimates. Housing related data has been collected from Minnesota Housing Finance Agency's Community Profiles project.

Gross rent: Gross rent is the contract rent plus the estimated average monthly cost of utilities (electricity, gas, and water and sewer) and fuels (oil, coal, kerosene, wood, etc.) if these are paid by the renter (or paid for the renter by someone else).
