# **General summary**

Catholic Eldercare is located in a residential, commercial, industrial neighborhood of Northeast Minneapolis. As of July 1, 2017, the United States Census Bureau estimates Minneapolis has a population of 422,331.

Catholic Eldercare on Main is a licensed adult day that is located on a continuum of campus type setting that also offers assisted living, independent living and skilled nursing. At the time of site visit on July 31, 2018 Catholic Eldercare on Main had a total of 12 people utilizing adult day services funded by the Elderly Waiver (EW), Alternative Care (AC) and four Community Access for Disability Inclusion (CADI) waivers.

# Adult day provider standards/qualifications

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for adult day services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Adult day services provided in center-based facilities are directly licensed by the Department of Human Services. Adult day services serve functionally impaired adults on a regular basis for periods of fewer than 24 hours during the day in a setting that is not a residence.

# Adult day service definitions that support the setting requirements

Minnesota's Community Based Services Manual (CBSM) provides the following requirements for Adult day services: <u>Community Based Services Manual information on Adult Day</u>

Adult day services must:

- Be based on the person's assessed needs
- Be directed toward the achievement of specific outcomes identified in the person's support plan
- Offer opportunities to participate in community groups (e.g., senior citizen centers or clubs, generic service organizations, adult education)
- Provide age-appropriate tasks and materials
- Provide community integration opportunities to enhance the person's social and physical interaction with people without disabilities
- Provide the supports necessary either to maintain or improve the person's ability to care for him or herself.

# **Prong 1 and Prong 2 settings**

#### Meaningful distinction between the facility and HCBS setting

The setting provides HCBS services in a space that is distinct from the space that institutional services are provided.

There is a distinct entrance for the adult day (setting, service). Currently there is no sign outside of Catholic Eldercare Adult Day. The director indicated money has been budgeted to add signage to the exterior of the adult day setting. New signage will help people navigate to setting. The adult day entrance is separate from the residential entrance. Signage will go at the entrance below.

# **Community engagement opportunities and experiences**

At the adult day setting, people are given opportunities to engage in the greater community weekly. People are informed about all activities at morning meeting. People are also aware of both onsite and offsite activities via a monthly calendar (sample calendar at the end of the report). People interviewed indicated they can go out in the community multiple times weekly depending on which days they attend the adult day. People may give input on activities at monthly meetings.

Some community activities include:

- Pontoon rides
- Men's fishing trip
- Walking in neighborhood
- Bowling.

During site visit, there was space provided for people to do independent activities (e.g. paint, draw or play games). Director and staff indicated they offer alternate activities for people that do not choose group activities.



Both people interviewed said they have opportunities for community engagement with no restrictions on community life activities. People have the opportunity to participate in health services as well as physical and, occupational and speech therapy. Staff reported people are informed about other service choices at the time of orientation and there is no restrictions if a person wants to change providers.	
In reference to recreational activities, staff reported people have choice not to participate in activity if a person does not want to do one. The choice of recreational activities was echoed by the two people interviewed at the site visit.

## **Public comment summary**

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment for 30 days (Feb. 6-March 7, 2019) before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages posted online on the <u>Home and Community Based Services Rule</u> <u>transition plan page</u>
- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via <u>Feb. 6, 2019, eList announcement</u>
- Notification to lead agencies via regional resource specialists
- Notification to providers via email
- Notification to managed care organizations and Area Agencies on Aging (AA) via email
- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

## Minnesota's recommendation

Date of recommendation: 4/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain on-going compliance with all HCBS requirements.
