General summary

Mission Today is located in a residential, commercial / industrial neighborhood of New Hope, Minn. As of July 1, 2017, the Census Bureau estimates New Hope has a population of 21,063. New Hope is a suburb, geographically located northwest of Minneapolis.

Mission Today is a licensed adult day facility located on a continuum-of-care campus that offers customized living, independent living and skilled nursing services.

Mission Today adult day serves approximately 51 people; 14 people who use the Elderly Waiver/Alternative Care and four people who use Community Access for Disability Inclusion/Community Alternative Care waivers. Mission Today also offers adult day bath, occupational therapy, physical therapy and speech therapy services. Mission Today provides two types of adult day programming: Reminisce Corner and Memory Lane. Memory Lane provides services to people with cognitive challenges.

Adult day provider standards/qualifications

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for adult day services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Adult day services provided in center-based facilities are directly licensed by the Department of Human Services. Adult day services serve functionally impaired adults on a regular basis for periods of fewer than 24 hours during the day in a setting that is not a residence.

Adult day service definitions that support the setting requirements

Adult day services must:

- Be based on the person's assessed needs
- Be directed toward the achievement of specific outcomes identified in the person's support plan
- Offer opportunities to participate in community groups (e.g., senior citizen centers or clubs, generic service organizations, adult education)
- Provide age-appropriate tasks and materials
- Provide community integration opportunities to enhance the person's social and physical interaction with people without disabilities
- Provide the supports necessary either to maintain or improve the person's ability to care for him or herself.

	The director of Mission Today indicated the adult day is administratively separate from the residential care setting. The settings have separate policies, directors, nursing, activities and resident assistant staff. The director reported Mission Today is a distinct entity separate from residential care setting.

Mission Today owns an accessible van for people to participate in community activities. The van is used to pick up and drop people off at their home in the morning as well as take people to off-site activities. People also rely on Metro Mobility, public transportation as well as family or friends to meet their transportation needs.

The entrance to the Mission Today adult day is located at 8650 55 th Ave. N, New Hope. The skilled nursing setting is located at 5500 Boone Ave. N, New Hope.



There is a distinct entrance for the adult day setting. Currently there is no sign outside of Mission Today Adult Day. Once inside the building, the space is identified via placard in the building (see image to the left).

Community engagement opportunities and experiences

Both director and the employee interviewed indicated people have the choice to experience the community at least once a week. In the end of the report are two calendars that illustrate the different activities between the Memory Lane and Reminisce Corner programs.

Some of the community activities for the Memory Lane Program include:

- Eating at local restaurants
- Walking group
- Shopping

During "activity interest" meetings, the people at the adult day help the activity director plan events and potential future activities. People are informed about all activities at a morning meeting. People are aware of both on-site and off-site activities via a daily board and monthly calendar (see daily activities below)

During the on-site visit, we observed space for people to do independent activities (e.g. paint, draw or play games). Director and staff indicated people may choose alternate activities if a person does not join in group activities.

During the site visit, the director showed the kitchen with refrigerator and snacks. Director indicated people may have food when needed. One person interviewed indicated people may go to the vending machine or get something to drink such as juice from the kitchen. One person interviewed said snack time is usually at 2:30.

Both director and adult day staff understand this requirement. People are informed about the right to seek employment at the time of orientation. The director and staff indicated they have one person on CADI waiver who works two days per week.	



No barriers to people accessing all areas were observed at the setting. The common spaces were observed to be accessible. The building had accessibility features.

Public comment summary

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment for 30 days (Feb. 6-March 7, 2019) before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via <u>Feb. 6, 2019, eList announcement</u>

- Notification to managed care organizations and Area Agencies on Aging (AA) via email
- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

Minnesota's recommendation

Date of recommendation: 4/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain on-going compliance with all HCBS requirements.
