#### **General summary**

The Shores is an elderly housing-with-services establishment registered with the Minnesota Department of Health. The Shores is owned by Ecumen. Ecumen Lakeshore, The Shores, holds a comprehensive home care provider license from the Minnesota Department of Health and is authorized to provide home care services.

The Shores is located on the Ecumen Lakeshore campus, a continuum-of-care campus that overlooks Lake Superior. A campus map is available in the Lakeshore brochure. The Ecumen Lakeshore campus is within the city of Duluth, in northeast Minnesota near Lake Superior. Duluth's 2016 population, according to the census, was 86,293. The continuum-of-care services offered on campus include independent living apartments; customized living, including memory care; a short-stay and rehabilitation center; home care; and transportation services.

The Shores is a 60-unit apartment setting that provides customized living services and housing for people 62 and older. Forty of the apartments are customized living apartments for people who do not require 24-hour supervision; 20 apartments offer customized living with 24-hour supervision in a secure environment specifically designated for memory care.

On its attestation submitted in December 2017, The Shores reported it provides customized living services to 65 people in the setting. Two of the people who were receive customized living services are funded by the Elderly Waiver.

#### **Customized living provider standards/qualifications**

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for customized living services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Customized living services are provided in housing-with-services establishments with the service provider directly licensed as a comprehensive home care provider by the Minnesota Department of Health. Customized living services provide an individualized package of regularly scheduled health-related and supportive services provided to a person who lives in a qualified, registered housing-with-services establishment.

## Customized living service definitions that support the setting requirements

Customized living (CL) and 24-hour CL services include component services designed to meet the person's assessed needs and goals. Individualized CL services may include supervision, home care aide tasks (e.g., assistance with activities of daily living), home health aide task (e.g., delegated nursing tasks), home management tasks, meal preparation and service, socialization, assisting enrollees with arranging meetings and appointments, assisting with money management, assisting participants with scheduling medical and social services, and arranging for or providing transportation. If socialization is provided, it must be part of the service plan, related to established goals and outcomes and not diversional or recreational in nature.

As shown in the aerial photo of the Ecumen Lakeshore campus, The Shores setting is circled in yellow. The Shores is connected to the Cascade Plaza that is the central building and offers services and amenities open to the public. The

Fountains circled in red, is a short-term health and rehab facility. There is clear separation between The Shores and The Fountains buildings.

#### **Community engagement opportunities and experiences**

The city of Duluth is an active community and hosts several community events and experiences. Examples of ways The Shores provides for community integration opportunities for people includes:

- The Shores uses the University for Seniors at the University of Minnesota-Duluth for educational classes for residents. One person who receives customized living with 24-hour supervision was leaving with her companion during the visit to attend her class. She enjoys attending class at the university on a regular basis.
- Taking pontoon rides on Lake Superior during the summer months
- Attending the Grandma's Marathon race whose route goes by the setting
- Going to inline skating
- Attending the Tall Ships celebration on Lake Superior
- Taking rides around the community on the Pedicab

People are also active in the community on their own. Examples of activities people do on their own or with family include:

Going out for pizza every Friday with family

- Going shopping throughout Duluth
- Visiting with family at the family home or in the community
- One person recently went on a two-week vacation, traveling to different states
- Going to the movies
- Going to the family's cabin

the life enrichment coordinator visits with each person soon after he or she moves in to discuss the person's social, spiritual, educational and wellness interests. Monthly program

calendars are posted on the bulletin boards and white boards as well as the dining room. Activity calendars are

> also provided to all residents and to their families upon request. People have the option to attend on-site activities as well. The campus has a large outdoor courtyard on the shore of Lake



Superior. The Cascade Plaza located on campus has a gift shop and

café and large chapel where services are provided a few times per week.

The setting has movie presentations. YMCA staff members come to the setting to provide a group fitness program open to people living at the setting and the community. A local animal companion program also comes to the setting with a German shepherd for people to interact with.



It was evident in observation and interviews with people, staff and the housing director that person-centered practices are at the forefront of service delivery by:

- Respecting and honoring the things each person thinks are important and encouraging informed choice and creativity
- Supporting activities are flexible and work around the person's preferred schedule (people are not following a "set schedule")
- Encouraging people to share ideas and make choices about setting activities based on their own personal preferences and interests
- Ensuring people have opportunities and supports they need to be fully included in their community, individually and in groups, as desired
- Assisting people with developing meaningful relationships with other members of the community

The Shores reported on its attestation that bedrooms are not shared in the setting. Apartments are only shared if a person chooses to have a person move in with him or her, such as a spouse or friend.

Apartments observed were occupied by single residents.

Apartments were observed to be decorated and furnished with the person's belongings and furniture.

regardless of whether Resident chooses to participate in a meal plan at the

Community. If Resident misses a meal, Resident does not have to wait until the next meal to eat. Resident is welcome to keep snacks or other food in the Apartment Unit."



Several observations were made where people may choose when, where and what to eat, such as café, restaurant, main dining room or own apartment.

The Shores' Resident Handbook" includes the following: "Guest suites and apartments are available for rent to family members and or guests of those who live at Ecumen Lakeshore."

The setting has several different visiting areas throughout the buildings. People living in the setting have the ability to "buzz" in their visitors from their apartment.

- "Each Resident's service plan will be developed based on individual needs, preferences and requests and will offer flexibility that supports lifestyle choice related to health, wellness, social, spiritual and leisure activities."
- "Resident is free to make arrangements for services with the providers of Resident's choice, regardless of whether or not the Community has an arrangement with the desired providers."
- "If you require home health services that are not provided by our agency, we will assist you in making arrangements with outside providers. We can assist you with making medical appointments and transportation arrangements for medical appointments."

We observed that people choose their own schedules and what they do throughout the day. People are also made aware that they may choose any community provider of choice. Ecumen provides transportation to community providers and events, as requested.

#### **Public comment summary**

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment for 30 days (Feb. 6-March 7, 2019) before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages posted online on the <u>Home and Community Based Services Rule</u> <u>transition plan page</u>
- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via <u>Feb. 6, 2019, eList announcement</u>
- Notification to lead agencies via regional resource specialists
- Notification to providers via email
- Notification to managed care organizations and Area Agencies on Aging (AA) via email
- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

#### Minnesota's recommendation

Date of recommendation: 4/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain on-going compliance with all HCBS requirements.
