Statements of support or dissent	Roach – Voted against package due to concerns with increasing complexity of system with focus on payment system (vs. care delivery reforms), lack of peer reviewed evidence for value-based payments and increase in administrative burden. 	Marty – Voted against due to concerns with increased administrative burden and costs, and existing quality measurement

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	system is flawed – concerned that building on a flawed system will compound problems, lead to unintended consequences.		
	Schowalter – Voted for the package. Measurement is important so we know what direction we are going. The growth is across the total cost of care, not just administrative costs.		
	Stivland – Voted for the package. Agreed, however, that we have a very narrow ability to measure the right care. We need to think about how we create a more efficient system. For example, healthcare system electronics are not created for the user, they are catered to capturing the measures, not improving care. Need to fix this before we rely on or focus more on quality measures.		
	Schulz – Supported package as an imperfect, but incremental approach, based on discussions with experts holding a variety of opinions. The package allows for incremental changes moving in the right direction, and urges legislators to support it in the legislature.		
	Wheeler – Supported package. It isn't perfect, but does include sound, incremental recommendations to help move the system in the right direction. Can't let striving for perfection get in the way of making the system better.
