Develop and implement both near and long-term strategies and guidance for populations facing increased COVID-19 risks:

- To best protect their health and safety
- To provide person-centered care and housing/alternative sites (outside of inpatient hospitals)

Governor Walz's Executive Orders

Executive Order 20-12: Waivers under peacetime emergency authority

Minnesota Statutes, section 12A.10 – Expedited reimbursement for nursing home providers in which one or more residents and/or staff are infected with COVID-19

- <u>1. Preserving health care coverage for Medical Assistance and MinnesotaCare amended (CV17)</u>
- 2. Allowing phone or internet visits for waiver programs (CV15).
- 3. Expanding access to telemedicine services for Children's Health Insurance Program, Medical Assistance and MinnesotaCare enrollees (CV16)
- 4. Allowing 90-day supply of prescription maintenance medications (CV19)
- 5. Postponing provider screening and re-enrollment (CV22)
- <u>6. Eliminating cost-sharing for COVID-19 diagnosis, treatment (CV20)</u>
- 7. Expanding telemedicine in health care, mental health, and substance use disorder settings (CV30)
- 8. Allowing phone or video use for targeted case management visits (CV24)

Changes under existing authority to respond to COVID-19

In addition to the changes outlined above under the emergency authority, the commissioner made the changes be the authority of existing laws,

<u>1. Waiving work requirements for certain SNAP participants (CV18)</u>

<u>2. Suspending sanctions for some Minnesota Family Investment Program and Diversionary Work Program pa</u> (<u>CV06</u>)

3. Expediting payments to nursing homes (CV01).

Medicaid Emergency Funding for COVID-19 Response

- Nursing facilities (since March 2020) have been eligible for expedited Medicaid rate payments for COVID-related costs
 - 24 Facilities have submitted from 1 to 4 applications each with a total of \$3.5M requested
 - \$2.1M has been approved for payment
 - \$1.1M in funding requests denied as not meeting requirements of section 12A.10.
- Assisted living providers received a 50% Medicaid rate add-on for 45 days when they reported 1+ COVID case among staff and residents between 3/13/20 and 7/31/20.
 Providers have until August 31st to submit documentation for a qualifying COVID infection event.
 - 386 providers eligible; 260 have applied and been approved
 - Total spending is around \$8M

The pandemic has not impacted all communities equally

 Significant higher incidence of COVID in certain communities of color; reflecting variations in employment; housing status; health disparities and access to PPE.






Overview of COVID Relief Fund (CRF) Proposals

Package of interventions, presented to the Legislative COVID-19 Response Commission (LCRC) on 7/28 and funding initiated on 8/10

- 1. Isolation Space and Shelter Response (Homelessness/Victim Services) (\$19m)
- 2. Enhanced Homecare Benefit (\$1m via AAAs)
- 3. Emergency Temporary Staffing Pool (\$4.6m)
- 4. MNsure Navigator Fee for COVID Diagnostic Coverage (\$0.2m)
- 5. Public Transportation/transit for at-risk people with COVID19 (\$0.9m)
- 6. Emergency Housing Assistance (\$100m)

Provider Alert Survey and RedCap COVID Crisis Reporting

- DHS survey tool gives a global overview of differing provider settings and their ability to access PPE, mobile testing resources and emergency replacement staffing (up to 14 days)
- RedCAP allows immediate, emergency assistance request to MDH/SEOC with COVID cases or symptoms




