General summary

Camilia Club is located in a metropolitan area of Minnesota where community activities, shopping, public transportation and other public venues are accessible and within close proximity (churches, parks, retail businesses).

Camilla Club serves 40 people receiving Medicaid waiver HCBS and offers heath and nutritional services and therapeutic recreation, including but not limited to coffee socials, celebration of special events, opportunities for social interactions both onsite and in the community.

Adult day provider standards/qualifications

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for adult day services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Adult day services provided in center-based facilities are directly licensed by the Department of Human Services. Adult day services serve functionally impaired adults on a regular basis for periods of fewer than 24 hours during the day in a setting that is not a residence.

Adult day services must:

- Be based on the person's assessed needs
- Be directed toward the achievement of specific outcomes identified in the person's support plan
- Offer opportunities to participate in community groups (e.g., senior citizen centers or clubs, generic service organizations, adult education)
- Provide age-appropriate tasks and materials
- Provide community integration opportunities to enhance the person's social and physical interaction with people without disabilities
- Provide the supports necessary either to maintain or improve the person's ability to care for him or herself.

The program administrator also reported that Camilia club helps set up outside transportation for people to go to medical and therapeutic appointments.

	There are a variety of transportation options used by the people receiving services at Camilia Club. During the admission process people are informed of transportation options and needs are determined. The adult day program has vans that are used between for transporting people to and from the program and to provide access to community events/activities. People also use Metro Mobility and family members for transportation. For people who have requested to take a metro bus on their own, staff have driven the person to the metro bus pickup hub.

Community engagement opportunities and experiences

Camilla Club Adult Day program is located within a residential neighborhood located near schools, churches, parks and retail stores.

Upon admission to Camilia Club, a person's activities and interests will be assessed and document on the "participant interest form" and filed in their case file. Participants are asked for suggestions on outings/community events at monthly "Participant Council Meetings". Staff take suggestions for outings/community events throughout the month as participants voice desires and bring these suggestions to the council meetings. Outings/community events are alternated per days of the week to provide opportunities for all participants to access and engage in community life as they choose and desire

Administration, staff and people receiving services mentioned the following community activities they have participated in:

- Picnics
- Movies
- Retail stores (e.g., Cabela's, Dollar Store, etc.)
- Concert hall
- Out to eat
- Church services
- Bowling
- VFW.

Staff noted that they check in with people on a regular (weekly/daily) basis on their preferences related to daily activities. It was observed that people are offered a variety of activities to participate in on a daily basis, people have choice of what to participate in and schedules are varied between each person attending. Onsite activities include trivia, bingo, crafts, cards and exercise. In addition to group activities (crafts, games, etc.), Camilia Club adult day also offers the option for people to choose solitary activities (puzzles, coloring, books). If someone chooses not to participate in a community activity, they either change the schedule for the week or stay back with staff.

The administrator reported that people receiving services known interests and strengths are taken into consideration by the program director and staff when developing the monthly calendar and that each person may choose which activities to participate in or choose not to participate. Independent activities offered to people that choose not to participate in group activities. This was verified by staff and

interviews with people.

Public comment summary

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment for 30 days (Feb. 6-March 7, 2019) before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via <u>Feb. 6, 2019, eList announcement</u>

- Notification to providers via email
- Notification to managed care organizations and Area Agencies on Aging (AA) via email
- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

Minnesota's recommendation

Date of recommendation: 4/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain on-going compliance with all HCBS requirements.
