Draft Brief Update on Waiver Reimagine Recalibration: Individual Support Waiver

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Purpose

This draft document provides a brief update on Waiver Reimagine budget ranges under the proposed Individual Support Waiver. These budget ranges have been recalibrated since they were last published, and the recalibrated budget ranges are included here. Also, the document summarizes how and why the disability waivers will change, defines key terms and provides context for understanding the budget ranges. Because of the impact of recent legislation, Residential Support Waiver budget ranges will continue to be recalibrated and updated. They will be made available when they are ready.

The purpose of this document is to get feedback from the Waiver Reimagine Task Force and the Waiver Reimagine Expert Panel before it is shared more broadly. DHS will share the final version with the public after we update it with feedback. We greatly appreciate the support of community members, including members of the Waiver Reimagine Task Force and Waiver Reimagine Expert Panel, who have helped to shape this effort.



Overview of planned changes

Minnesota's Department of Human Services (DHS) plans to evolve its disability waivers to make them more equitable, less complex and promote individual choice. Human Services Research Institute (HSRI) and partner Burns & Associates, a Division of Health Management Associates, have been supporting this initiative since 2018 through research as well as data and policy analysis. The use and cost of disability waiver services have increased significantly since DHS published budget ranges in 2021 using fiscal year 2019 data. As a result, the state wants to promote sustainable cost growth and protect future access to services.

The first phase of Waiver Reimagine focused on aligning services across Minnesota's disability waivers. This work created a more consistent service array and laid the foundation for moving from four diagnosis and level-of-care-based waivers to two service-based waivers: the Individual Support Waiver for people who live independently or with family and the

Significant growth in Minnesota Disability Waivers from fiscal years 2019 to 2025

- More people started receiving services (increased **43%**)
- Cost to support people grew (per-person costs went up **60%**)
- Total disability waiver spending increased **129%**

Residential Support Waiver for people who live in a structured (residential) setting. We anticipate that about two-thirds of people served in the disability waivers today will be on the Individual Support Waiver.

Under this new structure, a person receives funding using a “budget range” based on their age, assessed needs, and living setting. The person can use these funds to choose services they want and need according to their person-centered plan. These ranges cannot be directly compared to those published in 2021 because they are based on the updated MnCHOICES assessment, reflect current service use patterns and include current provider payment rates.

These budget ranges are used for most services people might choose when accessing the Individual Support Waiver, including in-home, day or employment supports, personal care, and respite services. However, they can be supplemented with more services that will not count against the budget range to create a comprehensive support plan. Self-direction, known as Consumer Directed Community Supports (CDCS), budget ranges will be the same as for a person who does not self-direct services. Individual Support Waiver participants will be able to mix and match traditional agency services and self-directed services.

DHS does not plan to change waiver eligibility or level-of-care determinations. A person on a waiver today will still be eligible for a waiver if they still have needs that qualify them for services.

DHS delayed the implementation of the new waivers and budget ranges. The new waiver plans, including the budget methodology that informs the budget ranges, must be approved by Centers for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS), including ensuring cost effectiveness before Waiver Reimagine launches.

Most people on the Individual Support Waiver will have similar or higher funding

- **About 85% of adults and 87% of children** will have budget ranges that match or exceed what they currently spend on in-budget services.
- **Nearly all CDCS users** will have the same or higher budget ranges. Overall, 93% of all CDCS users will have budget ranges that match or exceed their current funding.



Key terms

Support range: The amount and type of support a person needs. It is based on their assessed needs from MnCHOICES. People with similar needs will have similar levels of support.

Budget range: The amount of money available to plan and pay for in-budget services for the year. Budget ranges are based on people's support range, age and living setting. It is one part of the funding for a person's support plan.

In-budget services: The services a person pays for using funds from their budget range. The cost of all relevant services must fit within the budget range. The list of in-budget services is shown below.

Out-of-budget services: Services paid for separately and not using funds from a person's budget range. These services are included in the support plan alongside in-budget services. The list of out-of-budget services is noted within the budget range tables.

Budget exception: The process for a person with extraordinary needs to request additional funding for in-budget services if their needs cannot be met within their budget range. Budget ranges are

designed to meet the needs of most people currently on a disability waiver. Some people with needs greater than others in the same support range may not be able to meet those needs within their budget range. Each request will be reviewed and must meet specific requirements.

Support Plan Funding: Support plan funding is the total funding available to pay for the services and supports identified in your support plan. It may include funding from your budget range, approved budget exceptions, and out-of-budget services.

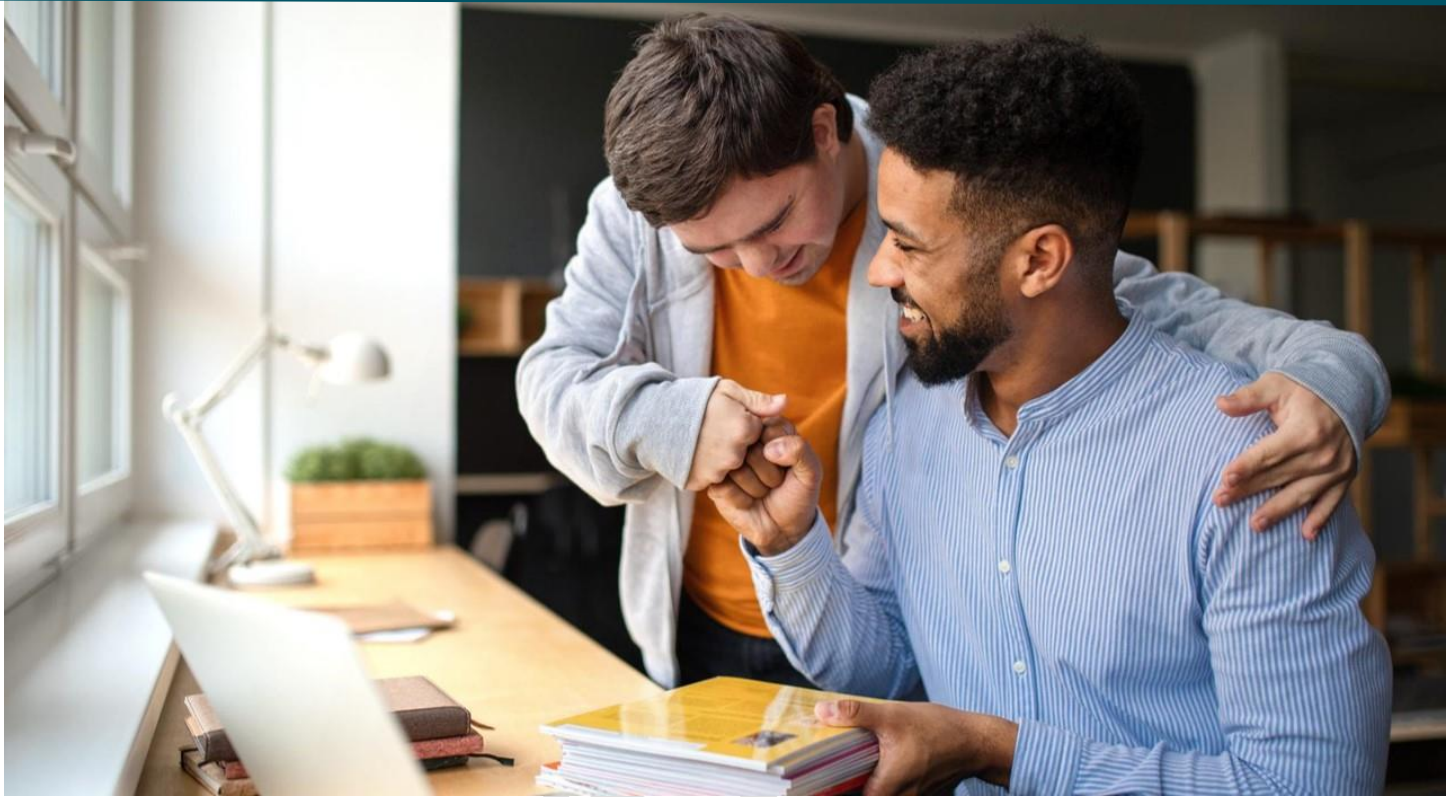

Recalibrated budget ranges: Individual Support Waiver

Budget range development approach

One of our guiding principles for calculating and updating budget ranges is to maintain service access for most people. For the ranges shown in this document, most people (about 85% of adults and 87% of children) would receive a budget range that matches or exceeds their current spending on in-budget services.

The budget ranges that we share here were developed specifically for Minnesota. However, the methodology is a common one used by many states and has been approved by CMS for many HCBS waivers.

An expert panel of 39 community members helped develop and test the budget model and identified changes that were needed.

Our rigorous methods include:

- Statistical analysis of assessed needs in the current MnCHOICES assessment for each person on disability waivers (assessments from April 2025-March 2026).
- Service use and spending analysis using statewide authorizations and claims data for fiscal year 2025.
- Review of current provider payment rates from the Disability Waiver Rate System (DWRS) and those paid in fiscal year 2025.

An expert panel of 39 community members including people receiving services, family members, lead agency staff, providers and disability advocates as well as DHS policy experts supported this effort. They all contributed to the development of the model and provided feedback to refine it.

A Budget Range Is Only Part of a Person's Support Plan Funding

A budget range is only one part of the funding available to pay for the services and supports in a person's support plan.

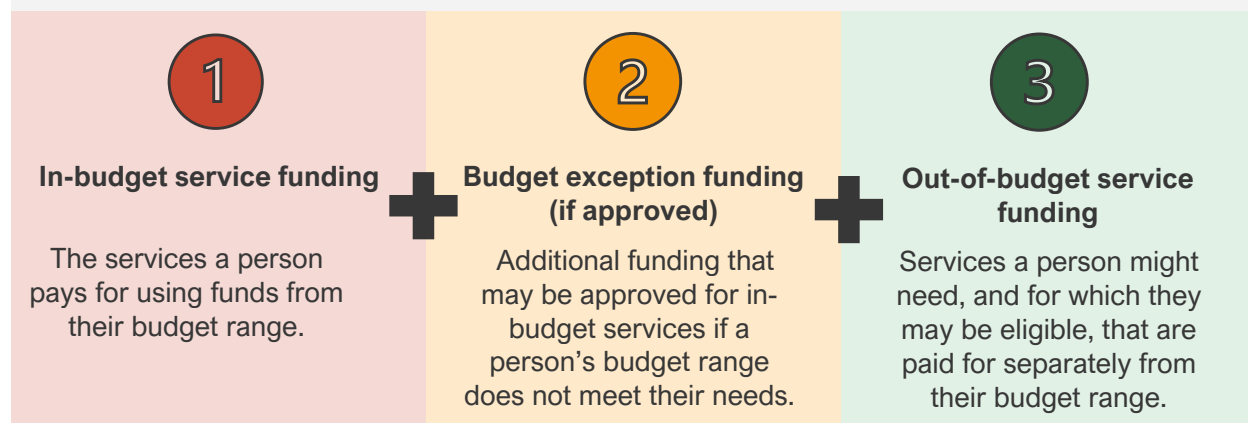
In addition to a budget range, support plan funding may include:

- Approved budget exception funding, if eligible
- Funding for out-of-budget services

Together, this funding covers the services and supports in a person's support plan.

Support Plan Funding Includes More than the Budget Range

A budget range is one source of funding used to pay for the services and supports in a person's plan. Support Plan Funding may include:



Recalibrated budget ranges

Budget ranges are different by waiver and based on the costs of services. Below we show budget ranges for adults and children on the Individual Support Waiver. On the Individual Support Wavier

we estimate that half of adults (51%) currently on a disability waiver would be in the first two support ranges (Levels 1 and 2) for people with low to moderate support needs. About 40% of teens and 35% of children 5-12 years old would be in Support Range 1 (low to moderate support needs). In contrast, most children under 5 years old (85%) would be Support Range H or E for people with high to extraordinary support needs.

DHS planned to start using the budget ranges that follow on Jan. 1, 2027. However, DHS announced that the implementation is being [delayed](#). Depending on how long the delay lasts, these budget ranges may need to be updated if MnCHOICES, provider payment rates or other key inputs change.

Recent legislation requires that a person's budget range is available to them one year before it goes into effect. Also, this legislation calls for DHS to phase in the new waivers and budget ranges. This gives people time to think about how they might want to use these funds to focus on services that help build independence and bolster each person's control over their plan and services to align with Minnesota's Olmstead Plan.

These ranges cannot be compared to those published in 2021. They are based on the updated MnCHOICES assessment, reflect current service use patterns and include current provider payment rates. The changes made to MnCHOICES mean that even though the support ranges look the same, they are made up of a different group of people. Therefore, the services that people use and the cost of those services that are used to develop the budget ranges are different than those used in the past. Also, the budget ranges reflect new decisions by DHS, like letting people get employment out-of-budget so that it will not reduce their budget range and having the same budget range for people living independently and with their families.

Adults and children on the Individual Support Waiver

Below are the recalibrated budget ranges for adults and children on the Individual Support Waiver.

Key takeaways

We appreciate feedback from the Waiver Reimagine Task Force and Waiver Reimagine Expert Panel on this update. The HSRI team used statistical and other analyses and worked with an expert panel to develop and test the proposed budget ranges. When reviewing these budget ranges, please remember:

- The budget range is only one part of a person's support plan funding. It pays for in-budget services. A person may also receive out-of-budget services, which are funded separately and do not count against the budget range.
- Budget ranges are not expected to work for 100% of people receiving services. People can request a budget exception if their needs cannot be reasonably met within their budget range.
- DHS delayed the implementation of Waiver Reimagine. This gives DHS more time to create safeguards for people whose needs cannot be met within their budget range and figure out the best way to phase in the new budget model.
- People will receive information about their support range and budget range 12 months before developing their support plan. This gives people, families, and others who support them time to understand available funding and plan for the future.
- Budget ranges cannot be compared to those published in 2021 because the support ranges are different in addition to different services and costs.
- DHS will update budget ranges if or when key inputs change before they are implemented.
