#### **General summary**

The Martin Luther adult day program is located in metropolitan Minnesota where community activities, shopping, public transportation and other public venues are accessible and within close proximity (churches, parks, retail businesses).

Martin Luther adult day serves 10 older adults and people with disabilities, providing entertainment, lifelong learning activities, intergenerational programming and a variety of offsite community activities on a regular basis.

#### Adult day provider standards/qualifications

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for adult day services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Adult day services provided in center-based facilities are directly licensed by the Department of Human Services. Adult day services serve functionally impaired adults on a regular basis for periods of fewer than 24 hours during the day in a setting that is not a residence.

# Adult day service definitions that support the setting requirements

Minnesota's Community Based Services Manual (CBSM) provides the following requirements for <u>Adult day services</u>:

- Be based on the person's assessed needs
- Be directed toward the achievement of specific outcomes identified in the person's support plan

- Offer opportunities to participate in community groups (e.g., senior citizen centers or clubs, generic service organizations, adult education)
- Provide age-appropriate tasks and materials
- Provide community integration opportunities to enhance the person's social and physical interaction with people without disabilities
- Provide the supports necessary either to maintain or improve the person's ability to care for him or herself.

	There are a variety of transportation options used by the people receiving services at Martin Luther Adult Day Center. The adult day program has 3 vans that are used between 2 adult day programs for transporting people to and from the program and to provide access to community events/activities. People also use Metro Mobility and family

#### **Community engagement opportunities and experiences**

People are asked about interests and preferences regarding onsite and offsite activities every 3 months (during care conference). During care conferences they review what they have done during the past 3 months and discuss with people what they would like to continue to do or if there is anything new they would like to try. Community activities are planned with the input of people receiving services. At the end of each month, people are asked what activities/events they are interested in to help develop a monthly activity calendar. People are also able participate in small group community events to accommodate interests and preferences. For example some people were very interested in going to the Prince Experience, while others stayed onsite to participate in other program related activities.

Staff and people receiving services reported that off-site community activities are planned at least one time per week. The off-site activities are also listed on the monthly calendars. Staff noted that they check in with people on a regular (weekly/daily) basis on their preferences related to daily activities.

People participating in the adult day services are made aware of activity options on a monthly and daily basis. The setting utilizes the following methods to inform people of their options including:

- 1. Daily activity options are written on a dry erase board located in the common area
- 2. Monthly calendars are printed for people to take/look at

There are 3 part time volunteers dedicated to the adult day program. Volunteers assist with onsite and offsite activities.

Community activities mentioned by administration, staff and people receiving services include:

- Air museum
- Baseball games
- History theater
- Restaurants
- Heritage Center
- James J. Hill House

- Bowling
- Brewery
- Movie Theater
- Picnics
- Summer music concerts.

It was observed that people are offered a variety of activities to participate in on a daily basis, people have choice of what to participate in and schedules are varied between each person attending. Onsite activities include baking, crafts, intergenerational programming, current events and musical performances. In addition to group activities (crafts, games, social club), Martin Luther adult day also offers the option for people to choose solitary activities (puzzles, coloring, iPad/IPod, books). If someone chooses not to participate in a community activity, they either change the schedule for the week or stay back with staff.

Martin Luther adult day has walking paths and an outdoor patio that is accessible to people receiving adult day services.



One person interviewed is actively pursuing a job in the community. The adult day program director and staff were both aware of her desire to work and have assisted her by coordinating with her case manager and residential program. The program director and staff reported that another person volunteers part time at VEAP food shelf.	
Another person interviewed reports she is retired. It was reported by the program director that most people are over the age of 65 and have chosen to retire.

These activities are designed to promote and stimulate intellectual, physical, recreational and spiritual well-being, and accommodate personal interests of current participants. Information is provided to people prior to admission and as needed of services available onsite medical and therapeutic services as well as a reminder that they have the right to choose use of offsite services if they prefer. Interviews with people receiving services confirmed that they have opportunities to contribute ideas for community activities on a monthly basis.

#### **Public comment summary**

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment for 30 days (Feb. 6-March 7, 2019) before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages posted online on the <u>Home and Community Based Services Rule</u> <u>transition plan page</u>
- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via Feb. 6, 2019, eList announcement
- Notification to lead agencies via regional resource specialists
- Notification to providers via email
- Notification to managed care organizations and Area Agencies on Aging (AA) via email
- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

#### **Minnesota's recommendation**

Date of recommendation: 4/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain on-going compliance with all HCBS requirements.
