### **General summary**

Heritage Cottage on 6th, Park Rapids is a nine-apartment, memory care assisted living setting. Heritage Cottage on 6th is located on the Heritage Community continuum of care campus that includes a skilled nursing facility, memory care, independent living apartments, assisted living and short-stay and rehabilitation transitional care services. Heritage Cottages are owned by Hubbard County and managed by Ecumen.

The setting is located within the city of Park Rapids, Minnesota and is near a local hospital, public park and residential homes. Local business are located a few blocks away. Park Rapids is a rural town in north-central Minnesota with a population, per 2016 census, of 3,935.

The vision statement of the Heritage Community states, "We envision a world in which aging is viewed and understood in different ways and services are provided in a manner in which people's lifestyle choices are honored."

#### **Customized living provider standards/qualifications**

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for customized living services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Customized living services are provided in housing-with-services establishments with the service provider directly licensed as a comprehensive home care provider by the Minnesota Department of Health. Customized living services provide an individualized package of regularly scheduled health-related and supportive services provided to a person who resides in a qualified, registered housing-with-services establishment.

# Customized living service definitions that support the setting requirements

Customized living (CL) and 24-hour CL services include component services designed to meet the person's assessed needs and goals. Individualized CL services may include supervision, home care aide tasks (e.g., assistance with activities of daily living), home health aide tasks (e.g., delegated nursing tasks), home management tasks, meal preparation and service, socialization, assisting people with arranging meetings and appointments, assisting with money management, assisting people with scheduling medical and social services and arranging for or providing transportation. If socialization is provided, it must be part of the service plan, related to established goals and outcomes and not diversional or recreational in nature.

### Community engagement opportunities and experiences

Heritage Cottage on 6th uses a variety of activities and experiences to engage people with the local community. One example is the local city park that is located immediately next to the setting. People are able to view the park from their apartment and watch the children play on the playground. People are able to go for walks in the park, if desired.

Other examples of community based activities that people participated in recently include:

- Pontoon rides on local lakes
- Fishing
- Attending high school concert series
- Visiting Itasca State Park
- 4th of July parade
- Live To Be Healthy, exercise physiology program for all residents of the campus
- Hosting Mary Kay parties
- Hosting local pre-school sing-a-longs
- Visiting local green houses
- Going on rides to view seasonal changes.

The setting also has activities on a daily basis. The activities are generated by the interest of the people living in the setting and are posted on a monthly calendar in the common areas of the setting. A copy is given to each person.

Examples of activities on the monthly calendar include:

- Musicians performing on-site
- Pedicures
- Baking
- Walks in the park
- Tending flower gardens/pots.

People also have active, individual family outings. Examples of activities that people attend with their family members include:

- Shopping
- Going out to eat at local restaurants
- Visiting the family home
- Going to appointments and spending the remainder of the day with family.

People also are offered one-to-one activities where they may enjoy visiting with staff out on the patio area, drinking coffee, playing games such as Jenga, watching TV or visiting with each other and people living in other settings on the campus.

#### **Public comment summary**

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment for 30 days (Feb. 6-March 7, 2019) before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages posted online on the <u>Home and Community Based Services Rule</u> <u>transition plan page</u>
- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via <u>Feb. 6, 2019, eList announcement</u>
- Notification to lead agencies via regional resource specialists
- Notification to providers via email
- Notification to managed care organizations and Area Agencies on Aging (AA) via email
- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

#### Minnesota's recommendation

Date of recommendation: 4/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain on-going compliance with all HCBS requirements.
