General summary

Perham Living Northwinds is a customized living setting located in the rural city of Perham, MN. Perham is located in northwest Minnesota, and, as of the 2016 census, the population was 3,300.

Perham Living Northwinds is located within a residential area of Perham and is within close proximity to churches, restaurants, healthcare, parks and shopping.

Northwinds is owned by the Perham Hospital District and is doing business as Perham Living Northwinds. This setting provides customized living services to people in need of specialized memory care services. One of the listed criteria to live at this setting includes, "You must require a secured living environment and/or higher level of personal support."

Customized living provider standards/qualifications

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for customized living services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Customized living services are provided in housing-with-services establishments with the service provider directly licensed as a comprehensive home care provider by the Minnesota Department of Health. Customized living services provide an individualized package of regularly scheduled health-related and supportive services provided to a person who resides in a qualified, registered housing-with-services establishment.

Customized living service definitions that support the setting requirements

Customized living (CL) and 24-hour CL services include component services designed to meet the person's assessed needs and goals. Individualized CL services may include supervision, home care aide tasks (e.g., assistance with activities of daily living), home health aide tasks (e.g., delegated nursing tasks), home management tasks, meal preparation and service, socialization, assisting people with arranging meetings and appointments, assisting with money management, assisting people with scheduling medical and social services and arranging for or providing transportation. If socialization is provided, it must be part of the service plan, related to established goals and outcomes and not diversional or recreational in nature.

All settings on the campus are owned by the Perham Hospital District. There is clear separation of the HCBS setting, Perham Living Northwinds, from the institutional setting, Perham Health nursing home, that is also located on the campus. The two distinct settings have separate policies, directors, nursing, activities and resident assistant staff.

Perham Living Northwinds has access to the campus van for community activities. The setting also has access to and uses the Perham city bus (Otter Express). Additionally, Perham has community volunteer drivers and family members provide transportation to people who receive services at the setting.

The setting provides HCBS services in a space that is distinct from the space that institutional services are provided.

The Perham Living Northwinds setting is connected to the Town Center, which is a common meeting area that is also open to the public. Included in the

and the Courtyard Café. The Town Center is located centrally between the HCBS setting and the Perham Health nursing home. At the far end of the Town Center is the General Store. The hallway behind the General Store in the picture (top right), is the

hallway that leads to the nursing facility. As the sign pictured (top left) shows, Perham Living Northwinds is located in the opposite direction from the nursing home.

Perham Living Northwinds also has separate outdoor signage and

Community engagement opportunities and experiences

People receiving services at Perham Living Northwinds who enjoy getting out in the community have the opportunity to go out and enjoy community events with the supervision of Northwinds staff. There is also regular daily and weekly activities held in the Town Center

that they may attend with the supervision of Northwinds staff or family, per the person's plan of care. Some examples of the activities occurring in the Town Center include:

- Yoga
- Tone chimes
- Special music events
- Happy hour from 3:30-5:30 p.m., where people residing at Perham Living are provided two tokens for free beverages.

Based on the abilities, interests and person-centered plans, Perham Living Northwinds has provided opportunities for people who receive services to attend and integrate into the community. Some examples of community engagement include:

- Attending "Pioneer Days" downtown: People receiving services participated in or observed Turtle Races, and they took rides around Perham on an old-fashioned trolley car
- Attending the town fair
- Attending local parades.

The Perham Rotary Club also tends to the gardens in the courtyard.



Northwinds also has a childcare and a Boys and Girls Club on campus that visits for activities for the residents to enjoy. One of the Boys and Girls Club activities held at the setting is "Garden Buddy" day. Gardening in

the courtyard is a shared activity involving both the children and people receiving services.

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People receiving services also attend community events with family members. Some examples of persons going out with family and friends include:

- Attending church
- Going out to eat and shopping
- Attending family events (e.g., weddings, showers)

Staying at the family cabin.

One person's husband occasionally stays overnight at the setting to visit with his wife.

"The activities at Northwinds are designed to promote physical, mental, spiritual, cognitive, and overall well-being of the residents. These activities may include, but are not limited to, exercising, crafts, music, sensory stimulation, games, and other things of the like."

If Resident misses a meal due to an activity, he/she does not have to wait for the next meal to eat. He/she is allowed to store snacks in his/her unit or a designated area that is accessible to him/her at all times."

Observations include kitchenette in apartments (note the space under the counter for small



refrigerator) and coffee/snack area in common area available at all times. A large refrigerator is also located in the



common kitchen area where people are

able to store their own or obtain snacks provided by the setting at any time. Also refer to "Pictures of the HCBS setting" section for additional photos.

The setting allows people to have visitors at any time.

Public comment summary

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment from April 30, 2019, to June 9, 2019, before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages posted online on the <u>Home and Community Based Services Rule</u> transition plan page
- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via May 10, 2019, eList announcement
- Notification to lead agencies via regional resource specialists
- Notification to providers via email
- Notification to managed care organizations and Area Agencies on Aging (AA) via email
- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

Date of recommendation: 7/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain ongoing compliance with all HCBS requirements.
