General summary

Sacred Heart Adult Day program is located in southern Minnesota nestled along a small river across from a park and centered within a residential neighborhood. The Sacred Heart Adult Day program is on the Sacred Heart Care Center campus with two dedicated areas and entrances for performing adult day services. Sacred Heart Adult Day program serves older adults and people with disabilities, specializing in the care of seniors with dementia-related disorders such as Alzheimer's Disease. Sacred Heart Adult Day coordinated activities are based on individual abilities and have been designed to promote socialization, stimulate physical and mental activity and enhance self-esteem. This setting reported on the attestation that it serves 51 people with various pay sources, including waiver funding and private pay. The program is staffed from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and extended hours may be arranged based on a person's assessed needs.

Adult day provider standards/qualifications

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for adult day services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Adult day services provided in center-based facilities are directly licensed by the Department of Human Services. Adult day services serve functionally impaired adults on a regular basis for periods of fewer than 24 hours during the day in a setting that is not a residence.

Adult day services must:

- Be based on the person's assessed needs
- Be directed toward the achievement of specific outcomes identified in the person's support plan
- Offer opportunities to participate in community groups (e.g., senior citizen centers or clubs, generic service organizations, adult education)
- Provide age-appropriate tasks and materials
- Provide community integration opportunities to enhance the person's social and physical interaction with people without disabilities
- Provide the supports necessary either to maintain or improve the person's ability to care for him or herself.

⊠Met □Unmet □Not applicable	Sacred Heart Adult Day has two separate areas to provide adult day services. Both designated areas have separate and distinct entrances to enter the adult day program. One area is dedicated to serving people with dementia-related conditions that includes an activities room, a community room and an outside garden area. The second designated area contains a large activities room, a community room with space for exercise and quiet reading and a separate kitchenette.



Community engagement opportunities and experiences

Sacred Heart Adult Day program is located in Austin, a city in southern Minnesota, nestled along a small river across from a park and centered within a residential neighborhood. Sacred Heart coordinates on-site and community activities on a monthly basis that reflect local community events and people's preferences. People are able to attend as often as they prefer, including arriving late or leaving early to accommodate other services and appointments.

People share their preferences and interests during intake, care conferences and during everyday conversation and observational experiences. The activities are flexible, often with weekly changes as people share their interests and preferences. Community activities are coordinated two to three times a month.

Care conferences occur every three months and staff directly ask people about the future activities they would like to see scheduled. People have the flexibility to choose which activities they participate in, with a range of options each day. The daily schedule is posted conveniently each day in the main activities room, near the community bulletin boards. The preferences shared by people include both group and individual activities.

Community activities shared by people who receive services and administration include:

- Community walks in town and throughout neighborhood
- Community entertainment events such as festivals and fairs
- Library
- Lunch and picnics
- Nature drives
- Visiting nature centers

Activities shared by people who receive services and administration include: crafts (sewing, painting), group discussions (Bible study, current events, future activities), Mass, picnics, gardening in the adult day's garden, musical entertainment, music memories and reminisce activities, word games, crossword puzzles, memory games, mini golf and ladder ball, singalongs, slides/movies, bingo, poetry, birthday parties, exercises, cooking/baking and recreational activities.

When on-site group activities are organized, the groups are typically three to four people and each person has the option of which group to join. If the group community activities are organized, people may choose to attend or remain on-site and participate in other activities. Transportation is provided during these outings.

Currently, one person who receives adult day services from Sacred Heart is working. The person is retired and works a few shifts at Walmart. When the person's shifts overlap with the day services, Sacred Heart will accommodate the person's typically planned day services schedule, including providing transportation or supporting the person to attend other days of the week.

The designated areas for adult day services are designed to support people with multiple mobility needs. We observed people navigating using scooter and walkers.

We observed Sacred Heart staff members communicating with people in a respectful manner, using people's preferred names. Staff offered assistance, inquired about a person's preference in how to receive support or options for the day. Respectful treatment of people was observed throughout the on-site visit. During the staff interview, the lead program coordinator became emotional when sharing how Sacred Heart supports people to remain engaged in their community, including how Sacred Heart provided supports for their own family many years ago.	
The people interviewed raved about their experience without prompting. They said Sacred Heart provides services that meet their needs, including options for accommodating a recent change in condition.

Sacred Heart's policies prohibiting the use of coercion and restraints submitted through the HCBS provider attestation are compliant. People who attend the adult day service in the designated memory care area have an assessed need for controlled access. People who do	

not have an assessed need for a memory care adult day are provided the option to receive adult day services in the second adult day designated area or provided the access code for the controlled-access areas.	
The setting optimizes individual initiative, autonomy, and independence in making life choices, including daily schedule and with whom to interact.	Compliant

The policies submitted via the HCBS provider attestation indicate people receive services based on their interests and preferences. The program coordinator then develops the monthly calendar shared at the beginning of each month with each person. On a weekly basis, the activities may change based on people's changing preferences. People may choose which activities to participate in or choose not to participate. There are independent activities offered to people who choose not to participate in group activities. This was verified in our interviews with staff and people who receive services. Staff support people to have individualized onsite options and identify individualized preferences for community activities. People interviewed confirmed they have choice and autonomy in their daily activities and may provide input to shape the daily and monthly planned activities.

Public comment summary

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment for 30 days (Feb. 6-March 7, 2019) before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via <u>Feb. 6, 2019, eList announcement</u>

- Notification to managed care organizations and Area Agencies on Aging (AA) via email
- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

Minnesota's recommendation

Date of recommendation: 4/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain on-going compliance with all HCBS requirements.
