General summary

St. Luke's Adult Day Services program is licensed to serve up to 10 older adults and people with disabilities with flexible schedules Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m to 4:00 p.m. The setting reported on its attestation that it is serving seven people across multiple payment sources, including HCBS waiver funding and private pay. During the on-site visit, the setting reported serving between 8-10 people. The setting is licensed to serve up to 10 people on a given day. St. Luke's Adult Day Services offers a variety of activities designed around people's needs, preferences and interests. The service setting offers group activities including baking, dance parties (e.g., polka, waltzes), hymns, noodle ball, bowling, community fairs and events, aerobics and picnics; and individualized activities including latchhooking, baking, walks, puzzles, beading and sewing.

Adult day provider standards/qualifications

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for adult day services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Adult day services provided in center-based facilities are licensed directly by the Department of Human Services. Adult day services serve functionally impaired adults on a regular basis for periods of fewer than 24 hours during the day in a setting that is not a residence.

Adult day service definitions that support the setting requirements

Minnesota's Community-Based Services Manual (CBSM) provides the following requirements for <u>Adult day services</u> (http://www.dhs.state.mn.us/id_002205#): Adult day services must:

• Be based on the person's assessed needs

- Be directed toward the achievement of specific outcomes identified in the person's support plan
- Offer opportunities to participate in community groups (e.g., senior citizen centers or clubs, generic service organizations, adult education)
- Provide age-appropriate tasks and materials
- Provide community integration opportunities to enhance the person's social and physical interaction with people without disabilities
- Provide the supports necessary either to maintain or improve the person's ability to care for him or herself.

	Luke's provides organization oversight but separates lines of business. Administrative staff referenced the facility staff "forgets" the adult day setting is connected. Staff are hired by St. Luke's Adult Day and receive adult-day-specific employee orientation and ongoing training.
⊠Met □Unmet □Not applicable	To the extent any facility staff are assigned occasionally or on a limited basis to support or back up the HCBS staff, the facility staff are cross- trained to meet the same qualifications as the HCBS staff; (staff training materials that speak of the need to support individuals' chosen activities), (person centered planning) (the staff is trained specifically for home and community-based support in a manner consistent with the HCB settings regulations.) The adult day setting staff do not provide services or support in the facility either on the same work shift or different work shifts. Adult day staff receive training on a monthly basis specific to the HCBS program and requirements.

It supports people to use local community transportation options that include Fairmount – Blue Earth County Public Bus, AMV, family and residential staff. To support community activities, St. Luke's partners with the public bus agency to coordinate transportation needs. St. Luke's Adult Day currently is exploring ability to secure its own transportation options to increase community activity options.
⊠Met □Unmet □Not applicable	The setting provides HCBS services in a space that is distinct from the space that institutional services are provided. St. Luke's Adult Day program is located physically on the opposite end of the St. Luke's Care Center campus's main entrance. The adult day program physically has its own frontage road with its own program signage and external entrance.

Community engagement opportunities and experiences

St. Luke's Adult Day program is located in southern Minnesota in a rural town within a residential neighborhood. The setting is situated on the edge of town, near the local high school's sporting fields and multiple churches. St. Luke's administration describes that a client council designs and provides input on the monthly activities calendar.

St. Luke's administration, staff and people receiving services reported participating in or planning the following community activities:

- Local fairs and concerts
- Picnics at the parks or gazebo
- Walks through the residential neighborhoods
- Coffee shops
- Bowling
- Birthday celebrations.

At the beginning of each day, the scheduled activities are shared during the morning discussion. This time is an opportunity for each person to request a change in the schedule or to choose other options and present his/her ideas for future options. People are able to share their activity preferences on a daily and weekly basis with staff. Offsite activities are planned monthly. St. Luke's coordinates closely with the local transportation options to facilitate the offsite community events. People are encouraged to bring their hobbies and activities into the service setting. For example, one person brings their latch-hooking supplies to work on projects. Others bring in personal puzzles and craft projects. St. Luke's offers on-site storage of in-progress craft projects.

Other activities on site are designed to promote and stimulate intellectual, physical and recreational health and include:

- Noodle ball (i.e., a game like soccer with foam swim noodles and balloons)
- Baking
- Arts and crafts (e.g., latch-hooking, beading and sewing)
- Dance parties (e.g., polka, waltzes) and hymns
- Aerobics and exercise
- Bingo
- Word games.



Per the attestation and as reported by administration and staff, employment is supported through a flexible schedule, including arranging transportation as needed. Currently, all people who attend the day program are retired. We observed throughout the on-site visit St. Luke's providing a flexible schedule, supporting people to arrive and depart throughout the day to accommodate medical appointments and preferred start times. One person used to work. During that time, St. Luke's assisted the person with arranging transportation and providing flexible activities or days the person would attend.

We observed people attending the program accessing different areas of the settings using wheelchairs and walkers. The setting organized their rooms to accommodate a range of mobility needs.

We observed greater choice in opportunities during the on-site visit than published on the monthly calendar. This supports the staff and person's experience as reported that planned activities are flexible and can change each day even from the planned calendars. available. People are able to choose activities based on personal preferences and interests. Calendars are shared with people monthly.

First names are used, and people are presented choices. People receiving services appeared well groomed and clothed appropriately for the weather.	
One person who was interviewed reports she enjoys attending this adult day program and receives excellent services. She likes the staff and the opportunities available.

Public comment summary

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment for 30 days (Feb. 6-March 7, 2019) before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via Feb. 6, 2019, eList announcement

- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

Minnesota's recommendation

Date of recommendation: 4/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain on-going compliance with all HCBS requirements.
