#### **General summary**

Saint Therese is a customized living residential setting located on a campus setting in New Hope, Minnesota. Saint Therese is within a residential area in close proximity to churches, restaurants, healthcare, parks and shopping. As of 2017, the U.S. Census Bureau estimated New Hope has a population of 21,063.

Saint Therese is a continuum of care campus that offers different levels of care, including independent living, customized living, long-term care, hospice/palliative care and transitional care.

Saint Therese is nonprofit, Catholic senior living and care organization.

As of Sept. 6, 2018, there were 15 people using customized living services funded by the Elderly Waiver. Saint Therese has 224 customized living units, as well as two customized living units that offer 24-hour care for people who have dementia or other cognitive support needs. One of these units has one space with four rooms, and the other has one space with two rooms.

## **Customized living provider standards/qualifications**

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for customized living services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Customized living services are provided in housing-with-services establishments with the service provider directly licensed as a comprehensive home care provider by the Minnesota Department of Health. Customized living services provide an individualized package of regularly scheduled health-related and supportive services provided to a person who resides in a qualified, registered housing-with-services establishment.

## Customized living service definitions that support the setting requirements

Customized living (CL) and 24-hour CL services include component services designed to meet the person's assessed needs and goals. Individualized CL services may include supervision, home care aide tasks (e.g., assistance with activities of daily living), home health aide tasks (e.g., delegated nursing tasks), home management tasks, meal preparation and service, socialization, assisting people with arranging meetings and appointments, assisting with money management, assisting people with scheduling medical and social services and arranging for or providing transportation. If socialization is provided, it must be part of the service plan, related to established goals and outcomes and not diversional or recreational in nature.

	Participants in the setting in question do not have to rely primarily on transportation or other services provided by the facility setting, to the exclusion of other options; (Describe the proximity to avenues of available public transportation or an explanation of how transportation is provided where public transportation is limited.)  People at Saint Therese have their transportation needs met through a mix of different organizations and people. Most residents do not rely on public transportation. The customized living setting provides transportation to community activities with a bus owned by Saint. Therese. Some people receive transportation services from other transportation providers, like Metro Mobility and family. Saint Therese offers a concierge service to arrange transportation needs.		

One person interviewed indicated they use both the van for activities and the concierge service transportation scheduling for appointments or shopping.

The setting provides HCBS services in a space that is distinct from the space that institutional services are provided.

The people living at Saint Therese have an entrance devoted to the customized living setting at 8008 Bass Lake Road. The entrance to the skilled nursing facility is 8000 Bass Lake Road in New Hope. A hallway separates the customized living and the skilled nursing facility setting as shown in the pictures below.

## **Community engagement opportunities and experiences**

At the customized living setting, people are given opportunities to engage in the greater community at least two times a week, and sometimes three times a week. People are informed of activities (both on-site and off-site) via monthly calendar that is delivered to each person's residence. People also learn about activities via announcements from staff. People may offer suggestions on the sign-up sheet or at monthly meetings. People are given the choice to participate in desirable activities and with any group of residents and choose activities via a centrally located sign-up sheet.

Some of the community activities include:

- Weekly swimming at local pool
- Visit to apple orchard (Apple Jack)
- Weekly shopping at local grocery stores
- Lunch outings to local restaurants
- Men's outing to VFW (paid by the VFW).

People living in the setting also get out on their own with family and friends, and with the support of community transportation options. These trips include:

- Medical appointments
- Coffee dates and restaurant meals
- Family events.

As reported by a monthly calendar (see calendar image in "pictures of HCBS setting" section), on-site, programmed activities include:

- Worship services
- Adult coloring
- Card club
- Seamstress
- Movies
- Music in the lobby with Michelle.

Each customized living resident has his/her own lockable unit.  Additionally, for people living in the unit that offers 24-hour customized living for people with dementia and support needs, each person has an individual lock to his/her bedroom door, since he/she shares the space with other people. The setting facilitates that a person, who shares a bedroom, is with a roommate of their choice.	Compliant

During the on-site visit, both interviewees lived in a single-occupancy room. Per the attestation, Saint Therese does not have shared bedroom options.	

The setting provides people with the freedom to furnish and decorate their bedroom and living unit within the lease or residency agreement.	Compliant

Both people interviewed decorated and furnished their own rooms. The setting provided an HCBS-compliant documentation in the attestation assuring people have the right to furnish and decorate their bedroom and living unit with the lease agreement.	
The setting provides people the freedom and support to control their daily schedules including access to food at any time.	Compliant

People each have their own kitchenettes in their apartments and ability to access food outside of meal times in "Café Rose," the cafeteria located in the setting. One person living in the setting reported she cooks most of the time and has access to the café any time of day. The other person interviewed said she also can access food anytime. Both people interviewed confirmed they have freedom to control their daily schedules.	
The setting allows people to have visitors at any time.	Compliant

Observed during the on-site visit was a sign-in sheet for visitors to the customized living setting. One interviewee confirmed her son is able to visit at any time.

Both interviewees reported they have no interest in employment. The administrator indicated people may pursue work or volunteer options.

Observed during the on-site visit was a physically accessible building. The two people interviewed acknowledged the accessibility of the setting. The common spaces and living units were observed to be accessible. Living units and bathrooms were observed to have many accessibility features.

See the community engagement section. Both residents interviewed said they have opportunities for community engagement with no restrictions on community life activities. Both people mentioned they are able to participate in weekly community life activities.	
The setting supports trips into the larger community for practical purposes (e.g., errands and medical appointments) but also for socialization and community engagement. The administrator indicated people may access other professional specialty services if the person needs them. People are informed about how to access other services in the resident handbook. If a person choose services like occupational therapy or physical therapy outside the setting, it is common for the setting to work with the person and the family.

Each resident interviewed indicated they have control over their personal resources. The provider indicated they do not offer money management services.

Both people interviewed reported they are able to exercise their individual initiative, autonomy and independence. One person interviewed said she felt free to come and go when she wanted. The other person interviewed said it was nice the setting/staff, "doesn't get after you."

## **Public comment summary**

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment for 30 days (Feb. 6-March 7, 2019) before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages posted online on the <u>Home and Community Based Services Rule</u> <u>transition plan page</u>
- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via Feb. 6, 2019, eList announcement
- Notification to lead agencies via regional resource specialists
- Notification to providers via email
- Notification to managed care organizations and Area Agencies on Aging (AA) via email
- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

## Minnesota's recommendation

Date of recommendation: 4/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain on-going compliance with all HCBS requirements.
