General summary

The Meadows of Mabel is a customized living setting located in Mabel, Minnesota. Mabel is located in the southeastern corner of Minnesota in Fillmore County. Mabel is a rural city, with a population of 753 in 2017.

The Meadows of Mabel has 17 apartment units. Currently, there are 15 people living in the setting. Four people are receiving services funded by the Elderly Waiver, and the remaining people are privately paying. The Meadows of Mabel is attached to Green Lea Manor, which is a nursing facility. Both of these setting are run by Green Lea Senior Living.

Customized living provider standards/qualifications

Licensure requirements and other state regulations for customized living services clearly distinguish these services/settings from institutional licensure or regulations.

Customized living services are provided in housing-with-services establishments with the service provider directly licensed as a comprehensive home care provider by the Minnesota Department of Health. Customized living services provide an individualized package of regularly scheduled health-related and supportive services provided to a person who resides in a qualified, registered housing-with-services establishment.

Customized living service definitions that support the setting requirements

Customized living (CL) and 24-hour CL services include component services designed to meet the person's assessed needs and goals. Individualized CL services may include supervision, home care aide tasks (e.g., assistance with activities of daily living), home health aide tasks (e.g., delegated nursing tasks), home management tasks, meal preparation and service, socialization, assisting people with arranging meetings and appointments, assisting with money management, assisting people with scheduling medical and social services and arranging for or providing transportation. If socialization is provided, it must be part of the service plan, related to established goals and outcomes and not diversional or recreational in nature.

The staff at the skilled nursing facility do not work or provide services at the customized living setting, except in emergencies. This was stated by both the administrator and the staff person interviewed. They both stated that if a skilled nursing facility staff person wanted to be scheduled to work at the Meadows of Mabel, the person would receive
☑Met☐Unmet☐Not applicable	Participants in the setting in question do not have to rely primarily on transportation or other services provided by the facility setting, to the exclusion of other options; (Describe the proximity to avenues of available public transportation or an explanation of how transportation is provided where public transportation is limited.) There is no public transit in Mabel such as a city bus or taxi service. People who live there are transported to activities outside of the setting through various other options. The setting owns its own vehicle, volunteers from Mabel Lutheran church volunteer to drive people, Blue Ride is available for medical appointments, family provides transportation and there are transportation resources available through SEMCAC, a community action agency.

This customized living setting is physically separate from the nursing facility, but the two settings are attached via a hallway. The blue rectangle is the Meadows of Mabel, the yellow rectangle is the nursing facility and the orange star is the hallway where the two buildings connect.

Community engagement opportunities and experiences

The Meadows of Mabel encourages and supports people to be as involved in the local community to the extent each person desires. The people living at the setting give input on the kinds of activities they would like to do at the monthly tenant meetings. They receive a monthly calendar, and there is a daily calendar posted to let them know what is available that day. Staff will also remind people verbally about activities in which they might want to participate. People can choose to look at the separate nursing facility activities calendar and join them if they wish. Some examples of community experiences offered are:

- Fishing
- Shopping trips
- Attending Steam Engine Days
- Watching the Tractor Parade
- Riding in the "people hauler," which is a tractor pulling people behind it in a trailer
- Concerts in the park
- Holiday lights tour
- Library trips.

In addition, people experience the community on their own or with family. Some examples of this are:

- Family gatherings (e.g., wedding and baby showers, birthday and anniversary parties)
- Having dinner at restaurants
- Shopping
- Walks with friends.

The setting also offers on-site activities, such as gardening, exercise, arts and crafts, games, movie nights, wine and cheese night, beer and pizza and on-site music. One person who lives there likes to run a trivia night.

Sometimes community members come to the setting, like school children or families during the sponsored Easter egg hunt.

People interviewed said they felt they could plan their daily schedules and do things when they liked. The staff interviewed said, "This is their home, they should just be able to do what they want." Each person has	
a kitchen in his/her unit, and he/she also can access snacks in the setting's refrigerator. Staff will save a meal for people if they let them know ahead of time that they will miss the meal.

During the interview, people indicated they knew they could have visitors at any time. The setting has a separate dining area people can use if family or friends come to dinner, as shown in the photograph. The setting accommodates her schedule by being flexible with her cares and other scheduled activities. The setting is physically accessible to the individual. The bathroom was accessible with grab bars and room under the sink. However, people can use any provider they choose, and they are told this when they move in. Also, when new referrals are given, people are told of their choices for providers. Staff assist people in setting up transportation or providing it themselves as necessary.

Public comment summary

The Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS) did not receive public comments for this setting.

DHS sought public comment for 30 days (Feb. 6-March 7, 2019) before submitting settings to the Centers Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for heightened scrutiny.

We sought public comments using the following methods:

- Evidentiary packages posted online on the <u>Home and Community Based Services Rule</u> <u>transition plan page</u>
- Evidentiary packages specific to each setting posted in a common area of the setting
- Notice of public comment period via <u>Feb. 6, 2019, eList announcement</u>
- Notification to lead agencies via regional resource specialists
- Notification to providers via email
- Notification to managed care organizations and Area Agencies on Aging (AA) via email
- Notification to long-term care ombudsman office via email
- Disability Hub MN virtual insight panel.

Minnesota's recommendation

Date of recommendation: 4/1/2019

Minnesota supports that this setting overcomes the institutional presumption and meets the requirements of a home and community-based setting. Provider is required to maintain on-going compliance with all HCBS requirements.
