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



Project Overview



Child Care Regulation Modernization Projects

In 2021, the Minnesota Legislature passed legislation and allocated federal funding to **support regulation modernization projects** for both licensed family child care and child care centers.



Purpose of Revised Licensing Standards

- ✓ Response to public comment or event
- ✓ Strengthen protections in a specific area
- ✓ Response to new research findings
- ✓ Revision or simplification of language
- > The current outdated standards were mainly written in the 1980s.
- > Child care licensing is currently governed by multiple MN Chapters which lacks alignment.





National Association for Regulatory Administration

- NARA is an international non-profit professional association founded in 1976 representing all human care licensing
- NARA's professional services and educational curricula have been used by dozens of states and Canadian provinces for program-specific research, training, and customized technical assistance.

- 2. Initial Stakeholder Survey (Stakeholders, DHS)
- 3. Draft of Revised Standards (NARA)
- 4. Targeted Engagement With Subject Matter Expert(Stakeholders, DHS)
- 5. Public Draft of Revised Standards

- Review licensing rules of other states/provinces
- Review accreditation standards
- Conduct impact studies and/or surveys




Stakeholder Input

- 1. Survey Guide to Licensing Standards
- 2. DHS hosted input sessions with subject matter experts. They included:
 - a. The Family Child Care Training Advisory Committee
 - b. CCC staff qualifications workgroup
 - c. Listening sessions with providers who serve children with disabilities
 - d. Center for inclusive child care
 - e. State agencies including MN Department of Health (MDH), DHS Disability Services Division, State Fire Marshal and more
- 3. This work is continuing...

Stakeholder Input - Survey

"Survey to Guide Revised Licensing Standards"

- ➤ Administered via email in October 2022.
- To gather information and feedback on regulations which stakeholders feel need to be updated, changed, or eliminated.
- > 1,271 respondents completed this questionnaire:

Notable Changes for FCC and CCC

> Alignment:

- Existing rules and statutes were consolidated to make them easier for providers to find.
- > Standards not moved were referenced ex. Crib Safety Standards as these standards apply to other license types, in addition to child care.

➤ <u>Updated</u>:

- > Standards regarding cleaning, sanitizing and disinfecting.
- ➤ Behavior Guidance
- > Children with disabilities or alternative accommodations
- > Health policies



Notable Changes for FCC and CCC (Continued)

> Added:

- Environmental Health Standards (in collaboration with subject matter experts)
- > Technology use



Behavior Guidance

Creates alignment and clarity by having relevant components in one section:

- Methods of promoting positive behavior
- Prohibited actions
- Persistent unacceptable behavior
- Separation from the group



Sanitation & Health (FCC and CCC)

Creates alignment and clarity by moving relevant components in one section:

Creates clarity by adding prescriptive language:

- Eliminates guesswork
- Create oversight consistency
- Reduced risk to children

Relocated components found in other sections:

• Diaper Changing Procedures



Environmental Health (FCC and CCC)

New chapter components including:

- Facility
- Radon Testing

Creates alignment by moving relevant components in one section:

• Water Supply (moved)



Highlights: Child care centers

Staff Qualifications

- Updates definition of "Education" to expanded list
- Creates new progression of education and experience
- Requires new
 Child Care Basics
 training for all
 staff

Equipment & Supplies

- Allows more flexibility in materials being stored or put out in the program
- Removes outdated materials from the list

Sick Children

- Updates exclusion lists
- Clarifies guidelines on when children can return after an illness



Highlights: Family Child Care

Training Requirements

 Organized in a way that provides clear training requirements for each type of caregiver in a family child care program

Children with special heath care needs or disabilities

- Increased information gathered from the parent to be more inclusive of the child's needs
 - Individual child care plans
 - Allergies
