






Map of Treatment Court Growth


10 Key Components


- State of knowledge as of 1997
- Derived from professional experience
- Measurable performance benchmarks
- Envisioned as 10 of them
- Never intended as the final word
- •What works!



10 Key Components

- 1. Drug Courts integrate alcohol and other drug treatment services with justice system case processing.
- 2. Using a non-adversarial approach, prosecution and defense counsel promote public safety while protecting participants' due process rights.
- 3. Eligible participants are identified early and promptly placed in the drug court program.
- 4. Drug courts provide access to a continuum of alcohol, drug and other related treatment and rehabilitation services.
- 5. Abstinence is monitored by frequent alcohol and other drug testing.
- 6. A coordinated strategy governs drug court responses to participants compliance.
- 7. Ongoing judicial interaction with each drug court participant is essential.
- 8. Monitoring and evaluation measure the achievement of program goals and gauge effectiveness.
- 9. Continuing interdisciplinary education promotes effective drug court planning, implementation, and operations.
- 10. Forging partnerships among drug courts, public agencies, and community-based organizations generates local support and enhances drug court effectiveness.





Best Practice Standards

What We Have Learned?

- •State of knowledge as of 2013 and 2015
- •Derived from an empirical threshold of approx. 50% to 100% improvement in outcomes; research listed
- Quantitative benchmarks
- All contributing elements
- Envisioned far more than 10

Minnesota Treatment Court Standards

- •Guide to the planning and implementation of treatment courts
- Incorporates The Ten Key Components and Adult Best Practice Standards
- Minimum requirements for approval and operation of all treatment courts in Minnesota
- •Recommended practices are outlined within each standard that treatment courts are encouraged to follow
- •Currently have Minnesota Treatment Court Standards for Adult Drug, DWI, Hybrid, Juvenile, veterans, and Family Dependency Treatment Courts.
- •First set of standards was approved by the Judicial Council in 2007
- •Finalized the revised version of the standards, which includes mental health and veterans courts January 2019

Overview of Online Self-Assessment

- Online Self-Assessment was done in June/July 2019 for the first time
- •All models, with the exception of FDTC Courts, completed the assessment
- Assess adherence to the Minnesota State Treatment Court Standards
- •Online Assessment was developed by the State Treatment Court Coordinator and State Court Administrator Research & Evaluation Unit
- •Results will be distributed by the end of 2019.

Treatment Court Initiative

- Advisory committee to judicial council
- •Examines long-term and systemic challenges facing the Judicial Branch
- Treatment Court Development and Expansion Process
- Distribution of MJB Treatment Court Allocations to local treatment courts
- Examines adherence to Minnesota State Treatment Court Standards
- Treatment Court Approval Process
 - olncorporates review of policy and procedures manual, memorandums of understanding, target population and sustainability plan
 - Makes treatment courts eligible to receive Branch funding

How are Treatment Courts Funded?

Treatment Court Funding Sources

- Federal (BJA, SAMHSA), State (OJP, OTS, DHS) and Local Grants
- MJB Legislative Appropriation
 As of FY20, approximately \$10 million (\$5 million/year) supporting existing treatment courts and administrative structure
- Typical Expenses
 Coordinator, Supervision, Defense Counsel, Law Enforcement, Drug Testing, Program Supplies, Training, Travel

History of Treatment Court funding in Minnesota

2007 MN Legislature appropriates \$4.2 million to Treatment Courts for 2008-2009

2015 Judicial Branch includes \$5.6 million in 2016-2017 base budget for Treatment Courts

2009 Judicial Branch includes \$3.1 million in 2010-2011 base budget for Treatment Courts

2017 Judicial Branch includes \$9.1 million in 2018-2019 base budget for Treatment Courts

2013 Judicial Branch includes \$4.7 million in 2014-2015 base budget for Treatment Courts

2019 Judicial branch includes approximately \$10 million in 2020-2021 base budge for treatment courts

Treatment Court Funding

- Funding Formula was implemented in July 2018
- Currently 38 courts in the formula (drug, veterans, FDTC, Hybrid)
- Mental health courts are funded by the Department of Human Services
- •DWI Courts are funded by the Office of Traffic Safety
- •Federal grants fund the remainder of the operational treatment courts (BJA, BIA)

Key Successes

- 1. The incredible work of local treatment court teams!
- 2. Support of state, local, and federal partners
 - \$1.6 million from Department of Public Safety
 - \$850,000 from Department of Human Services
 - \$4.6 million from Bureau of Justice Assistance (past two years)
 - Local partners (city/county)



- 3. Strengthening statewide collaboration and infrastructure
 - Statewide funding formula
 - Revised statewide standards
- Updated policies, practices
- State and National training
- Nearing launch of Statewide Treatment Court Supervision Module

Vision for the Future

- Statewide access to treatment courts.
 - 14 counties
 - Transfers among all counties
 - Engage local justice partners to discuss in custody issues of treatment court participants
- District Outreach and Technical Assistance
- Unique collaborations
 - Across Judicial Districts
 - Across State Lines
 - Federal Charges/Tribal Lands
- Continue to strengthen statewide collaborations
- Monitor adherence to the Standards
- Data Collection and Evaluation
- Training
